Catholic Health International Response to Bill C-14 (medical assistance in dying)

Catholic Health International, along with many other organizations across the country, are reviewing Bill C-14 to assess its impact on the care we provide in our facilities. We will continue to advocate for the most vulnerable among us and expect that laws and policies must specifically respect and protect individuals and organizations that decide not to be involved in physician-assisted death on the basis of conscience. In keeping our mission and values, Catholic health care organizations are committed to assist each dying person to:

- Make informed decisions about their end of life care;
- ♦ Decide when to refuse or withdraw life sustaining interventions when the burdens resulting from treatment are clearly disproportionate to the benefits hoped for;
- ♦ Receive effective pain and symptom management to lessen pain and suffering;
- Have access to high quality palliative and hospice care that encompasses support for the spiritual, physical, emotional and psychological dimensions of the end of life experience for the dying person and family.

We will work with our health systems in New Brunswick, Ontario and Nova Scotia and our partners across the rest of Canada to develop legislation, policy and regulations at the provincial level that address conscience protection for individual and institutional healthcare providers. Everyday in Catholic health care organizations across the country, our physicians and staff provide outstanding compassionate care to people at the end of life. We are confident we will find a way to respond respectfully and compassionately to requests for physician assisted death that does not abandon the person in our care nor compromise the values of our providers or organizations.
