CHARITIES AT WORK

On International Women's Day, the story of the Sisters of Charity is a unique one of empowerment, shaped by both past history and present good deeds often undertaken away from the limelight.

Their contributions are made through dedicated women such as Sisters Anita Holmes and Celene Hurley, who have been quietly and selflessly aiding other women in neighbourhoods as diverse as Vancouver's downtown east side and Saint John's Waterloo street.

"I really felt a call to be with the people in a really special way, " said Sister Anita, who - along with Sister Celene, who has worked alongside her since 2003 - spent a few years assisting downtrodden women in Vancouver's most notorious neighbourhood. They volunteered at women's shelters in the downtown eastside neighbourhood, and saw up close the suffering caused by substance abuse and other challenges.

Returning to Saint John, the two members of the Sisters of Charity saw the potential to undertake similar outreach work here in the Port City. They soon partnered with Outflow, a ministry that has operated a men's shelter on Waterloo Street, to offer support and an smpathetic ear to women in need.

They established Oasis in March 2015, a clean and inviting women's drop-in centre in the basement of the old Baptist Church on Waterloo Street. Serene music plays in the background as trays of cookies and crackers are offered to whomever might be hungry, and the two Sisters and the volunteers who support their efforts are always ready to welcome world-weary visitors.

"Women started to come," said Sister Celene. "Not by the dozen, but they did come."

This support for women is ingrained in the work of the Sisters of Charity of Immaculate Conception, a religious order that was started in Saint John in 1854 in response to a cholera epidemic that wreaked havoc among many of the city's poor Irish Catholic families. From those humble beginnings, the religious order extended across the continent, eventually establishing missions in western and northern Canada and even as far away as Peru. And while its overall membership is smaller and greyer than in decades past, the women who are part of the Sisters of Charity still remain a force for societal good - and remain fiercely committed to improving the lives of women both at home and abroad.

"It makes me happy that it's International," said Sister Muriel, when asked why the women's day was so important to celebrate. It's key message?

"That we accept all women - that they all have their place in society," said Sister Muriel.

In a city and province where investments in human potential are all too often considered along budgetary lines, the core humanity of the Sisters of Charity shines through in the daily work of its members. It's more than a feminist influence that's been sending ripples outward since 1854 - it is a recognition of a core humanity that links everyone.

"People need to be listened to," said Sister Celene, who spends her afternoons with women who may be facing significant personal or mental challenges, and is clearly bothered by the amount of individuals who will physically walk away from both men and women visibly down on their luck, if only because they feel uncomfortable around someone simply because their clothes might be dirty.

"A lot of people just ignore them. People just kind of frown, and they notice it."

But it's not all just devotion and service, throughout the year. The Sisters will also teach line dancing on occasion, and their volunteering throughout the community has allowed them to develop a rich and rewarding social network.

"Sister Celene volunteers at Romero House, and has gotten to know the names" said Sister Anita with a smile, at the end of our conversation on Waterloo Street. "When I was first back in Saint John, I thought, 'she knows all the guys - I'm jealous!"

The plan was developed in harmony with the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada and other Sponsor groups through Canada and the United States.
