

### **CENTRE FOR EXCELLENCE IN LEADERSHIP—Update**

At the Leadership Council meeting held April 3 & 4 in Montreal, Pillar Chairs provided an update to attendees.



Values Integration Assessment
Program: Claire Savoie reported that a schedule for the assessment of our facilities is complete. CHI Policy #5002 (available on our Members website) outlines the assessment fees for the program and funding subsidies available from CHI. "Best practices" and success stories will be shared across our system

in the Torch and on our website. **Mission Development**: Dave Schneider reported his committee is participating in a number of teleconference interviews with mission leaders from throughout the Catholic healthcare industry in Canada and the United States. The plan is to solicit ideas and tools for mission orientation and development that can be utilized by our facilities. **Catholic Healthcare Leadership**: Bonnie Ruest reviewed the project charter wherein they hope to establish a baseline of existing leadership capacity in CHI member corporations including competencies and programs of study, and then determine future program needs for our organizations. **Ethics:** David Levangie reported that presentations that have already been done, are being collected from across the Canada. They are also compiling a speaker list that can be used by CHI facilities.

**Spiritual and Religious Care:** Marthe Léger informed the group that they are looking into the current structure within the various spiritual care and pastoral care departments across the CHI system. The plan is to develop training standards.

While in Montreal, Bob Stewart met with the Pillar Chairs. He would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone involved with the Centre for their hard work and dedication!

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Hotel-Dieu Grace Healthcare, Windsor ON, currently provide Windsor and area residents with extensive mental health and addiction/substance abuse programs and services. A steering committee was established to look more closely at gaps within the current system, especially the vulnerable and/or those in any way marginalized. It quickly became apparent that a downtown presence was needed to focus on individuals who experience mental health and/or addiction or substance abuse events, and to provide them with an alternative to an emergency department visit. They don't necessarily need emergency care or admission to hospital. The program model was developed and somewhat based on the Bob Janes Triage Centre in Fort Meyers Florida.

A proposal was submitted to local government who have since approved a \$1.8 million annual operating fund for a Transitional Stability Centre. It will provide 25-50 beds in the city core. The Centre will operate 24/7 and be staffed by nurses, social workers, case managers and residential attendants. A nurse will perform an intake assessment and then start the process to determine the clients needs.

**St. Joseph's Continuing Care Centre** (SJCC), Cornwall ON celebrated Volunteer Appreciation Week on April 9<sup>th</sup>. The celebration was marked with their Volunteer Services Awards and the Catholic Health International (CHI) Volunteer of Excellence Award. Nominees for the CHI Award were Betty Febrile, Gloria Hoggett, Rejean Lefebvre, Cathy Miron and Brenda Petersen.

Annual meetings: June 11, 12 & 13 September 11, November 19 Hotel Dieu Hospital, Kingston, ON has opened a cuttingedge eye treatment centre, the first of its kind in Canada. "The opening of this Centre demonstrates the commitment of Hotel Dieu Hospital and Queen's University to provide our macular patients with world-class care," says Dr. Sanjay Sharma, a retinal specialist at HDH, a professor of ophthalmology and epidemiology at Queen's University and an internationally-recognized expert in macular degeneration. "Patients can access the best treatment in the country, and we can continue to be at the forefront of macular disease research and train doctors from around

the world who come to learn from us."

Retina problems - caused by aging and diabetes are now the most common cause of vision loss and blindness. Early diagnosis and timely treatment has changed these diseases from ones in which blindness was inevitable



to ones in which visual improvement is highly probable," says Sharma. "To obtain optimal outcomes, macular disease has to be recognized and treated early and quickly," says Sharma. "With the latest treatments, 95% of patients can be spared from going blind and 40% can enjoy significant improvement in vision."
