# St. Joseph's Villa celebrates 50 years in Cornwall

In October 1969, St. Joseph's Villa opened its doors to Cornwall seniors and other people in need of long-term care. Last month, a celebration was held at the facility to celebrate the past 50 years of providing a much-needed service to the community. Staff members and residents gathered in the Catholic long-term care facility's chapel for a small celebration, which included a birthday cake, refreshments and speeches from dignitaries such as Auxiliary Bishop Guy Desrochers and Cornwall Mayor Bernadette Clement. The bishop led the assembly in prayer to bless the facility and Clement brought a certificate of congratulations from the city and the best wishes from council.

Although the facility is celebrating its 50th anniversary, its history goes back much farther than that. In 1879, five Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph arrived in Cornwall with a mission of creating a hospital in the city. They founded their hospital in the former residence of the first premier of Ontario, John Sandfield MacDonald, known as Ivy Hall. It started with just 30 beds, a pharmacy, an operating room, a chapel, and rooms for the five nuns.

#### Sculpture recognizes work of Religious Congregations

At Carleton Park in Fredericton on October 16, Catholic Health International proudly unveiled "Transformations," a sculpture in recognition of the rich history of the work of Religious Congregations over decades in providing health care, education and social services in many communities throughout the Province of New Brunswick. ### Religious Hospitallers of Saint Joseph celebrate new Skeletal Observation Lab

Kingston Health Sciences Centre's Hotel Dieu site (previously Hotel Dieu Hospital) has a long history of supporting research under the oversight of the Religious Hospitallers of Saint Joseph (RHSJ). Under their guidance, Hotel Dieu continues to foster and develop patient-oriented innovation, and nurture a culture of research and supporting infrastructure.

In acknowledgement of their mission of compassion and caring, the RHSJs were invited for a private tour and to help launch the new Skeletal Observation Lab (SOL) at the KHSC-Hotel Dieu site on Oct. 23. This multimillion-dollar, leading-edge facility offers

scientists and clinicians unique insights into the biomechanics of the bones and joints in the human body, leading to improved treatments and preventive strategies tailored to the individual. It is expected that in the tradition of the Sisters, research in the SOL will lead to advances in orthopaedic medicine and guide the future direction of patient-centered care,

Dr. Michael Rainbow, the lab's lead scientist and Assistant Professor of Mechanical and Materials Engineering at Queen's University, and Dr. David Pichora, Professor of Surgery and Mechanical and Materials Engineering at Queen's University and President & CEO of KHSC, along with graduate students, demonstrated their research in this recently completed lab, showcasing its new state-of-the-art equipment.

As is the tradition at Hotel Dieu, the Sisters commemorated the new facility's official opening with a blessing, delivered by Sister Marilyn Larocque.
