ANITA HOLMES, SCIC - BOARD CHAIRPERSON



Sr. Anita Holmes entered the Sisters of Charity of the Immaculate Conception in Saint John, New Brunswick in 1965. She studied Nursing in Antigonish, Edmonton and Halifax. Her nursing career brought her to Prince Albert, SK, and Saint John, NB. She was Administrator of Rocmaura Nursing Home and Ruth Ross Residence. From 2002 to 2010 she ministered to the homeless, street women and those adicted to drugs in the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver, BC. In 2015, she and Sister Celene Hurley began a drop-in ministry for women called Oasis, in Saint John. She was re-elected to the SCIC Leadership Circle in July 2018. Sr. Anita has been involved in many boards and committees during her career including the Atlantic Health Sciences Corporation and the Catholic Health Association of Canada and currently is a member of the Rocmaura Nursing Home Board of Directors, a member of the St. Joseph's Hospital Advisory Committee and chairperson of the Catholic Health International Board of Directors.

The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) formed a Joint Ad hoc Committee on Palliative Care with a variety of partners and experts to address the increasing complexities regarding end-of-life issues in Canada. The Committee members included representatives from Pallium Canada, Dominican University College, Canadian Catholic Bioethics Institute, Catholic Health Alliance of Canada, Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph in Canada.

The Toolkit seeks:

- Empower and educate parishioners by addressing questions surrounding palliative care, dying, death, suffering, accompaniment, and bereavement in a holistic fashion.
- Present high-quality content that explores how palliative care is understood from a perspective of Catholic moral and pastoral theology, medical expertise and the Compassionate Community model.
- Facilitate meaningful conversations together so that our parishes and families become Compassionate Communities, grounded in the mercy and tenderness of the living Christ.

The Toolkit is available to anyone interested in learning more about palliative care and is free of charge. Materials are provided on the CCCB website in both English and French.
