SISTER ROSE-MARIE DUFAULT, RHSJ

Catholic Health international has lost one of its founders. Sister Rose-Marie Dufault passed away suddenly in Montreal on Wednesday, March 22. Sister Dufault was born and raised in Windsor Ontario, entering the Congregation of the Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph (RHSJ) in 1955 and professed in 1957. She graduated with a nursing diploma at Hotel Dieu Montreal, a Bachelor of Nursing degree from the University of Montreal in 1963 and received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree, from Assumption University in Windsor, on behalf of the RHSJ for their contribution to health care in the city of Windsor, while celebrating her 50th anniversary of Religious Profession.

She began her healing ministry as a nurse in 1965, later becoming Head Nurse of the Emergency Department of Hôtel-Dieu Hospital, and eventually Director of Nursing. She was heavily involved with her

Congregation being elected to the General Council in Montreal serving in this capacity for 12 years. In 1997, Sister Dufault was appointed by then RHSJ General Superior Anne Marie Savoie to head a Corporate Restructuring Task Force. The Task Force had the following mandate: to identify the needs being met in and through their institutions, to identify the responsibilities of sponsorship within the context of health care today; to propose options for new corporate structures within the context of civil and canonical requirements; and to recommend implementation of preferred options. One of the options was the formation of a new Public Juridic Person of Pontifical Right to be known as Catholic Health Partners Inc. (Catholic Health International). Sister Dufault was instrumental in bringing this option forward which was adopted by several congregations, the Bishops of the local Dioceses and the Holy See.

In 2001 she was appointed to the Director of Education Services with Catholic Health International managing and overseeing the Catholic Healthcare Leadership Program. Sister Dufault was always available to provide input and suggestions to any project with Catholic Health International. Many of the graduates of the program know her for her dedication and work ethic.

In 2003 upon her retirement from her work on the General Council she returned to Windsor and was appointed Vice-President, Mission Services at Hôtel-Dieu Windsor and Corporate liaison to the RHSJ Health System. She participated on various task forces and committees at both the Diocesan and Congregational levels throughout her career.

Throughout her career and beyond, Sister Dufault had a passionate commitment to continuing the mission, identity, and legacy of Catholic healthcare, especially



for the poor and marginalized. Those that worked with Sister Dufault will remember her tenacity, compassion, and love for Jesus and the community she served. She will be missed by her Congregation, the team at CHI and all those who knew her.

God Bless her and may she rest in peace!

This is a wonderful accomplishment.






ST. JOSEPH'S CONTINUING CARE CENTRE **CELEBRATES EQUITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION**

PHYLOMÈNE ZANGIO ADDRESSES MINORITY RIGHTS AT THE UNITED NATIONS

Phylomène Zangio, Facility Activities Manager at l'Hôpital Stella-Maris-de-Kent, in Sainte-Anne-de-Kent, NB, was in Switzerland recently to address the United Nations about minority issues. She represented the Black francophone community as part of the United Nation's 15th forum on minority issues in February. The forum identifies and analyzes issues and best practices to strengthen the Declaration on the Rights of Persons Belonging to National or Ethnic, Religious and Linguistic Minorities, which was adopted in 1992. This year's forum, titled "Review, Rethink, Reform," celebrates the 30th anniversary of the declaration.



Zangio points out the need to reflect on francophone racial minorities in New Brunswick as well as elsewhere in the country. "The forum is an opportunity to bring this issue forward," she said, stressing the "importance of bringing to the challenges faced by racial minorities living in minority language situations to collective consciousness."

Zangio said only two years remain in the International Decade for People of African Descent, which the UN General Assembly proclaimed in December 2014, and she noted it is crucial for New Brunswick's achievements to be part of the mix.

Phylomène is a member of the New Brunswick Human Rights Commission as well as the first Black member of the Judicial Council. She was named one of the 100 Black Women to Watch in Canada in 2022.


